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This month we are faced with a very difficult task - we're going to talk about our relatives - relatives we've been close to since our younger days. We realize there are some things better left unsaid but we'll endeavor to bring you up to date on the lives of our cousins, Eleanore and Pete Harry.

Us Lymans were married in 1936 and the Harrys decided to become Mr. & Mrs. on June 19, 1937. They spent some of their "courtin" time at our home and we had some

great times together which have continued thru the years.

Perhaps a little family history is in order - Lowell (better known as Pete), son of Walter & Gertrude Norcross Harry was born in Casco Twp. Mar. 7, 1915. At that time Pete's folks lived in the house across from Mt. Pleasant Subdivision, the family later moved to the larger home where Grandpa & Grandma Harry had resided. Pete has 1 brother and 3 sisters, he attended McDowell School and graduated from So. Haven Hi. He also took an Agricultural Short Course at Mi. State. His father was a farmer and one of the first cauliflower growers in this area and Pete recalls that his mother was a school teacher and taught at Bradley, MI. (just so. of Wayland) and drove a horse and buggy home on week-ends to visit her folks - she also taught in the Evergreen Glade district, so. of Hawkhead.

Eleanore, daughter of Uncle Edgar and Aunt Grace Lyman Rice, was born in Hinsdate, Ill., a long time ago (as she puts it). Our birthdates are pretty close and we feel that we make up quite a lively little group of St. Citizens, of course she has twice the pep of the 2 of us put together. Her family moved to MI. and settled in Kibbie. She completed her 8 grades at Kibbie school, graduated from So. Uncle Edgar attended McDowell school - his family lived just east of the church across from the Trigg family - while Aunt Grace grew up in the house where Dick and Myrtle Tourtellotte lived and attended Buys school - among her teachers were her sister, Aunt Cecile Paquin, and her brother, Dad (Ed) Lyman - I wonder if they kept her after school.

When Eleanore came to the McDowell district, Pete decided he would date the school marm and as a result, they became man and wife. Pete (an enthusiastic hot-rodder) had farmed with his Grandfather Norcross prior to their marriage which occured at Kibbie Community Hall with Rev. Wright officiating. During winters Pete worked at various other jobs - at Nat'l Motors, Bohn Aluminum and Fleming Oil Co., sometimes milking cows before going to his factory job. He also served on the Federal Land Bank Board.

The Harrys started housekeeping on the Rundell farm across the road from Everett Fowlers (the Rundell farm was later the John and Pearl Shilling place). We can remember taking our sheets and pillow cases with us and spending some fun weekends there.
